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Our New Look

Why?

Ronald McDonald House® Global recognized the need to unify our brand, as research has shown that 69% of people do not know what exactly it is that we do and 3 out of every 4 people do not understand the relationship with our Founding & Forever partners, McDonald's.

As of the end of 2024, there are 258 chapters and 387 programs across the world... many of which (especially those outside of North America) operate under a different name and look.

Ronald McDonald House Global's aim is to modernize all chapters by the end of 2027; Ronald McDonald House Canada will be an early adopter in this process, with modernization beginning October 2025.

Our modernized brand will drive consistency across chapters, create and improve awareness, allowing us to communicate our shared mission more effectively. These efforts will ultimately allow us to serve and strengthen more families.

New Look, Same Heart



Name

We have globally aligned our name to be Ronald McDonald House, followed by the specific chapters' name. In our case, we are Ronald McDonald House Saskatchewan.

Positioning

Our positioning guides the actions that we do, to support our mission; putting families at the heart of care.

The House that Love Built

For anyone who has stayed at, volunteered with or visited the Ronald McDonald House in Saskatoon, you may recall reading the words 'The House that Love Built', either inside the House or upon departing, catching a glimpse of the House sign on University Drive. Since 1985, those words have been a reminder of the community of support that has wrapped itself around this place and the families within, for 40 years.

40 Years of...

In 1985 visionary leaders and province-wide community engagement opened the doors to The House that Love Built. Throughout these 40 Years, in community with one another, we have now served over 31,000 families in the House and Family Room programs in Saskatchewan offering a place of hope and strength in building a community that cares for one another. This House, built on a solid foundation, enables us to care for those that need it most.

Through the Miles to Go Capital Campaign, we have been uplifted by the incredible generosity and vision of our community. Earlier this year, the Province of Saskatchewan joined early donors in making a transformational \$10M investment, helping to ensure that more families will have a place to stay close to their sick child.

Because of these remarkable commitments, we have broke ground on and are building two new Houses — a 20-room House in Regina and a 12-room House in Prince Albert. These spaces will soon provide comfort, care, and hope for families when they need it most, with doors set to open in January 2027.

The Miles to Go Capital Campaign has been championed by a new wave of visionary leaders and community-minded companies. Early supporters include our Capital Campaign Co-Chairs — Craig and Pam Lothian, Jan and Ken Malenfant, and Isla Wilcox — as well as Capital Auto Group and Orano Group. Their leadership and generosity have set the pace for the campaign and continue to inspire ongoing efforts to reach our \$39.9M goal.

“Leaving Ronald McDonald House Saskatchewan left us with some mixed emotions. We can finally bring our kiddo home. No wires, no tubes, no nurses, no doctors, just us.”

“Our first experience with Ronald McDonald House Saskatchewan occurred when my firstborn decided to come out early. He was only 29 weeks, weighing 958 grams when he was born on November 26, 2023, I guess he wants to celebrate his first Christmas with us.

Before coming to Ronald McDonald House Saskatchewan, I remember feeling overwhelmed by what happened to me, and to us. We were first-time parents. At that time we did not know the House existed. I was sad thinking that we needed to spend some time in the hospital as my son needed to gain weight and strength. No one would want to stay in the hospital with your firstborn or your children, right?

Living and staying in Ronald McDonald House Saskatchewan was a big help for me and my husband. We were just minutes away from our son. We were from here in Prince Albert but when we stayed at the House we felt at home. Having a place where you can have a nice shower and also have a home-cooked meal. It’s like a home away from home to us. The staff was so friendly and approachable. They were so nice asking us every day how our day was, how were we feeling, and offering us what they could offer. They treated us like family.

When I first walked into the room where we would be staying I remember thinking that this is so sad staying and sleeping here in this nice room while our son was staying in the hospital in his incubator alone. But also I remember saying to my husband ‘Wow, this room is amazing, we’ve got everything we need, and twice as big as our own room in our house’.

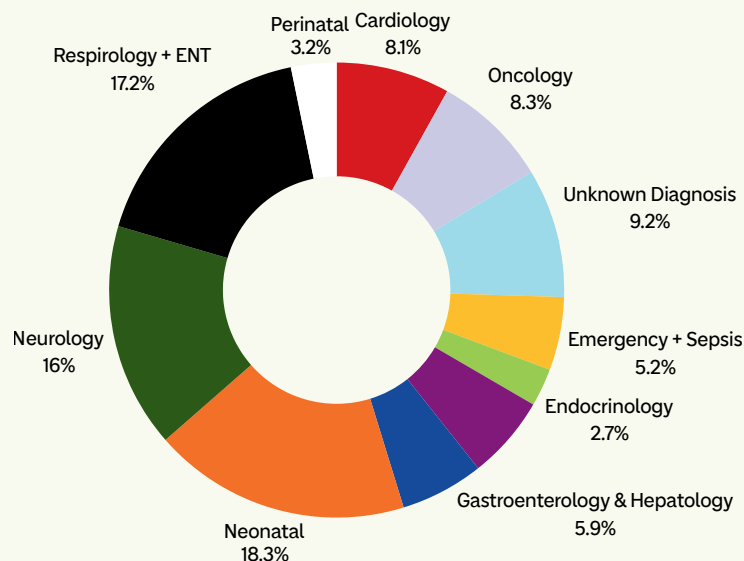

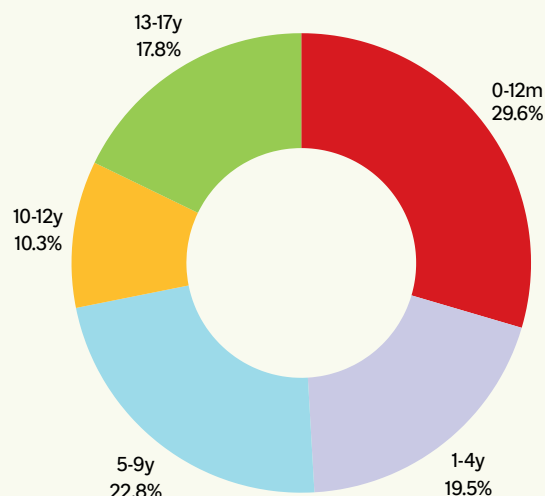

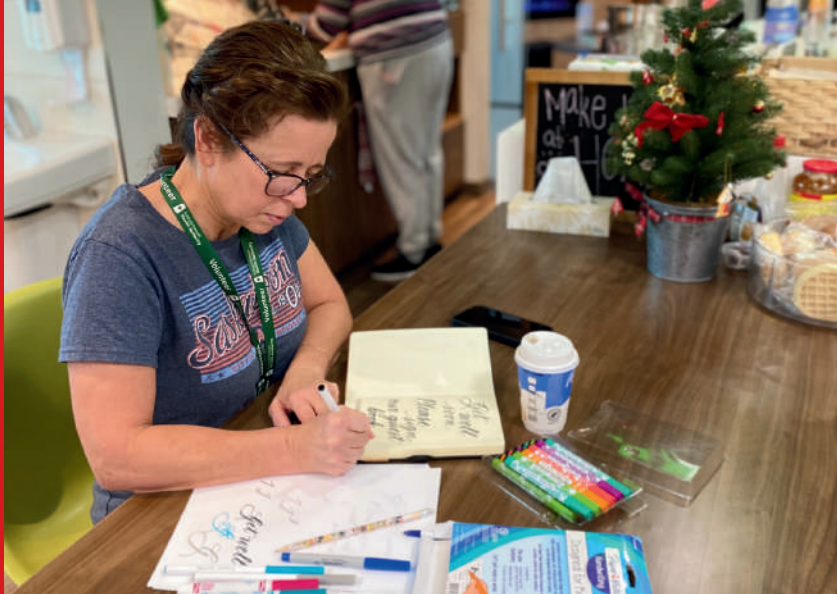

In the spirit of respect and relationship, we presented tobacco and invited Elder Liz Settee, a respected Elder from Prince Albert, to offer her guidance and support following her participation in our Land Blessing Ceremony with Knowledge Keeper Lyndon Linklater. Held on April 30, 2024, this ceremony of prayer and intention blessed the site where the new 12-room Prince Albert House will be built. Elder Liz graciously accepted our invitation to walk with us on this journey.

Since then, Elder Liz has joined the Prince Albert House Campaign Cabinet and has become a vital connector, reaching out to Elders and Knowledge Keepers from northern communities across diverse Nations and language groups. With her guidance, we are more deeply connected to what families from northern and First Nations communities need, to feel welcome, and supported.

A meaningful outcome of this work has been the creation of the Ronald McDonald House Elders Advisory Circle — a group of Elders walking alongside us to help shape the House and surrounding spaces. From ideas for ceremony grounds and outdoor gathering areas to culturally safe family spaces, the Circle is ensuring we create not just a physical House, but a true place of belonging.

We are deeply grateful to Elder Liz and to all who are sharing their wisdom, time, and hearts. This work is more than an expansion — it is an opportunity to strengthen relationships, honour diverse ways of knowing, and create a healing space for all families, especially during some of life's most difficult moments.

In late November 2024, we celebrated our very first Ronald McDonald House Saskatchewan House Party — and what an incredible few days it was! Communities from across the province came together, in support of families, and the result was truly inspiring.

Over the course of three unforgettable evenings, nearly \$400,000 was raised towards our shared mission. We are so grateful to everyone who attended, sponsored, and contributed to the success of these events — your generosity makes a real difference in the lives of families across Saskatchewan.

The 1st Annual Ronald McDonald House Saskatchewan House Party saw guests mingling, enjoying unique venues, listening to live music, gathering with friends, and sharing delicious food, all while supporting Ronald McDonald House Saskatchewan. Guests were treated to food stations, words from a House family, and had the opportunity to bid on exclusive live and silent auction items.

In addition to the Red Jacket Classic Golf Series and House Party events, we kicked off 2025 with our first-ever Families for Families campaign that ran throughout the month of February. Over the course of the month, families across the province were encouraged to support families we have served. Finding Strength in the Hardest Moments

“It felt like for a minute my world stopped spinning out of control. It felt like I could finally exhale.”

“Hey you, yeah, you.

I can see you. I can see that hurt. Even though you're smiling and telling everyone you're okay. You're hiding behind your shield.

I know because I've been where you are. A little over 2 years ago my world came crashing down, just like yours did. On May 29th, 2023 we were completely blindsided when we found out a tumour was sitting on our 5 year olds heart and lungs, threatening her life.

You're overwhelmed, you're mentally drained, you can't handle another tough conversation with a medical team member or incoming message asking what's going on, and you just need to shut off and make it all stop for just one minute.

Cue Ronald McDonald House Saskatchewan.

Allow me to share my experience. I recall sitting in a room with my husband and my daughter's new oncologist and a social worker as they gave us her diagnosis. I was a shell of myself. I wasn't even listening to what they were saying, just trying to understand the how and why this could happen to my family. I missed my other kids so much. I missed my dog. My heart felt shattered. I just wanted someone to pinch me so I could wake up and it would stop.

During the information overload session the social worker mentioned the House and asked what I knew about it, which to be honest, wasn't very much. She asked if she could send a referral for us. I looked at my husband and shrugged. I didn't want to take away space from another family and I had no plans of leaving my daughter's side. I told her we'd discuss it and get back to her. My husband said why don't we just take it. If we felt we didn't need it we could give up our room. I reluctantly agreed. He went over without me to check in and came back (with fresh baked treats in hand for us) and said you need to go check it out. So I did.

I went over with no expectations but if I did, they were exceeded the minute I walked in.

It felt like for a minute my world stopped spinning out of control. It felt like I could finally exhale.

On top of the instant sense of comfort I felt upon walking in, I was informed of the on site childcare offered while we were there, which felt like an elephant getting up off my chest as it clicked. This is how I can keep my family together. I felt so much relief in that moment.

As time progressed and our daughter was able to leave the hospital for stays at the house our comfort there grew and the pieces of our life started slowly putting themselves back together. We connected with families dealing with similar circumstances and made some life long friendships. We became so close to the staff and volunteers at all levels, they felt like family to us. A genuine kind of connection that feels so special and rare, and ones we'll cherish forever, because they're the ones who reached out their hands when we were face down on the ground.

Recently an old friend reached out, out of the blue. Their family members child was diagnosed with cancer. She asked what kind of advice she could pass on in these early days when it's all very scary and uncertain. While it's been such a whirlwind for us and going back to those early and dark moments can send a shiver straight down your spine. The first thought that came to mind was accept the RMHC referral. It's where you'll plant your roots to grow your life back from the mess it's become, and as far as I'm concerned, the only way to mentally survive this journey.

This life is not for the weak. But you will get through it. One day. One moment at a time. Life seems to test the ones it knows can handle it.

It will feel extremely lonely and it will feel like some kind of cruel punishment but you will get through it, one day you'll look back on this time and wonder how you survived it, but you'll know you did, and you'll be so much stronger because of it.

You got this. You all do.”

McHappy Day®

A great Canadian tradition founded in 1977, the first Wednesday in May each year, McDonald’s restaurants across the country host McHappy Day, an annual celebration of giving to support Ronald McDonald House Canada and local charities. A portion of the funds raised on this day go directly to support Saskatchewan Families. In 2025, McDonald’s Saskatchewan raised \$296,104 – 100% of these funds stay in the province, to support families!

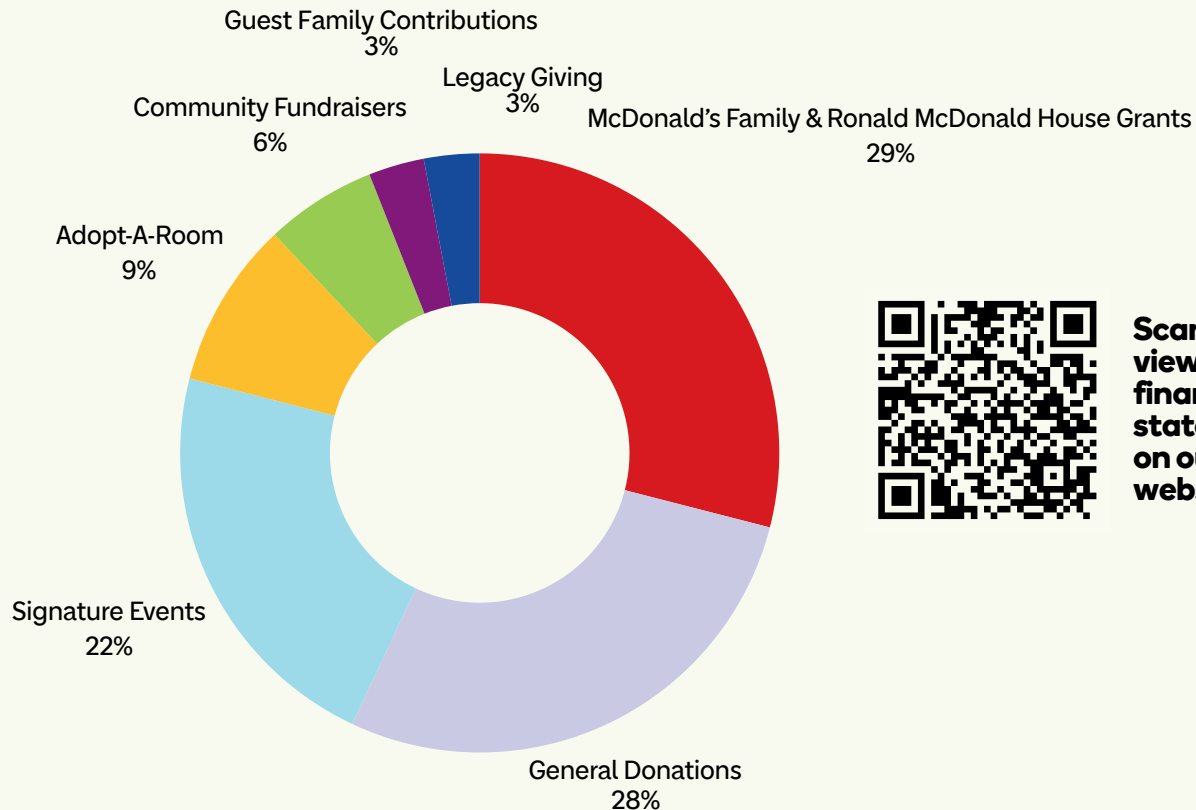

a reflection...

“Within the walls of the Saskatoon Ronald McDonald House, I saw a house of hope – where families, who were strangers at first, grew connection in shared solidarity, in whispered strength, and in stories carried over coffee. It was here I learned: proximity is more than geography – to be just steps away from a hospital bed when your child fights a quiet battle is to breathe a little easier, to rest without guilt, to wake with resolve.
